### **Outcomes for Pupil Premium Students in 2016**

In 2016 the three year improving trend in the Capped 8 including English and Maths Value Added score for Pupil Premium students continued. This has now improved by thirty points since 2014. Whilst the VA gaps between Pupil Premium students and the non-Pupil Premium students narrowed this was distorted by the disappointing results across the whole cohort in Maths and English.

Whilst the gap between the Progress 8 score for Pupil Premium students and that for non-Pupil Premium students narrowed from 0.95 in 2015 to 0.44 in 2016, this can again be accounted for by deflated results for other students. At this point, comparative data is not available to compare the performance of Pupil Premium students at Chiltern Edge against their peers nationally in 2016. Their performance is still well below that of all students and non PP students in the national cohort.

At the end of the summer term 2016 the currently working at grades for Year 10(current Year 11) indicated that the Value Added Scores for Pupil Premium and Non-Pupil Premium students were virtually the same at 948/949. The low scores reflect the conservative grades resulting from the Year 10 Maths and English exams where the students sat sample papers for the new GCSE Syllabus.
